








Global Grants

What Global Grants Support

- Humanitarian projects
- Scholarships for graduate-level academic studies
- Vocational training teams, which are groups of professionals who travel abroad either to teach local professionals about their field or to learn more about it themselves



Global Grant Funding

- The minimum budget is \$30,000
- The Foundation's World Fund provides a minimum of \$15,000 and maximum of \$400,000
- Apply on My Rotary



Global Grant Funding

- Clubs and districts contribute District Designated Funds (DDF) and/or cash contributions that the World Fund matches
- DDF is matched 100 percent and club cash is matched at 50 percent. Global grants can also be funded with endowed earnings and directed gifts. A 6% administrative fee is applied to club cash and directed gifts



Global Grant Qualification

- There must be a host and an international partner
- The project must address one of the six areas of focus
- The project must be sustainable
- A needs assessment is required





Program of Scale Grants

Program of Scale Grants

- Address a clearly defined need that reflects community priorities and engages its leaders
- Sponsored by a Rotary club or district and implemented with an experienced partner, such as a nongovernmental organization, private institution, or government entity



Program of Scale Grants

- Use Rotarian leadership to guide the project to succeed
- Include activities that can be adapted for use by other communities with similar needs
- Each year, one approved project will receive \$2 million from The Rotary Foundation's World Fund



Disaster Response Grants

Disaster Response Grants

- To support relief and recovery in areas affected by natural disasters within the past six months
- Can be used to provide basic items such as water, food, medicine and clothing
- Districts are responsible for identifying needs and distributing funds
- A district may receive a maximum of \$25,000



District Grants

District Grant Projects

- Humanitarian projects, including service travel and disaster recovery efforts
- Scholarships for any level, length of time, location, or area of study



District Grant Projects

- Youth programs, including Rotary Youth Exchange, Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA), Rotaract, and Interact
- Vocational training teams, which are groups of professionals who travel abroad either to teach local professionals about their field or to learn more about it themselves

Qualification



- Attend the Grant Management Seminar
- Sign the Memorandum of Understanding
- Preference given to clubs with \$100 per capita giving to the Annual Fund
- All qualified requests will be funded if funds remain after the \$100 per capita clubs have been funded

Funding



- \$110,601 available for the 2020 – 2021 Rotary Year
- \$3,000 per club on a 2/1 basis
- Example: Club contributes \$1,500 and receives a \$3,000 District Grant

District Grant Cycle

- Applications accepted from July 1 through December 31, 2020
- Final reports from the 2019 – 2020 Rotary year are due on December 31, 2020
- Clubs are not funded until the project is completed and the final report is approved
